

MATERIALS LIST FOR SILVER WATERCOLOR 4-Day Class

Supplies

Bring your own watercolor painting kit, if you already have one. The following are what I highly recommend:

- 1 Sheet 140 lb. Cold Press or Soft Press watercolor paper Fabriano Artistico, Saunders Waterford or Arches recommended. Around \$7-\$10/sheet. (Please NO Canson, Strathmore or any paper that comes in a spiral bound notebook - it's student grade paper and will the paint will not flow).
- □ 2 waterproof boards, approx. 12"x18" or larger (Gator board, PlexiGlass, or treated Masonite).
- \Box Watercolor sketch book, 5x7 or larger. For sketches, color samples and notes.
- Watercolor brushes (not mixed media or acrylic): Large Round Brush (#12 or #14ish), Medium Round (Size #6-#8). Ilike Loew-Cornell with the red stripe. One 3/4" Flat brush. <u>https://www.dickblick.com/products/loew-cornell-ultra-round-watercolordecorativebrushes/</u>
- Professional watercolorpigmentintubes; at least ablue, a red and a yellow. I recommend Daniel Smith's line. My semi-regular palette is listed in table below. <u>https://www.dickblick.com/products/daniel-smith-extra-fine-watercolors/</u>
- □ Palette. I an inexpensive watercolor palette with 3 or 4 generous-sized, *separated* mixing areas and at least 12 color wells (see last page for link). Though, you may want a folding or covered palette for ease of transport.
- □ Two (2) wide-mouth and shallow water containers. Recycled plastic margarine or cottage cheese tubs work great!
- □ Spray bottle with misting spray
- □ Absorbent towels: Terrycloth hand towels and Paper towels (I like Viva)
- □ 1 Roll 1-2" plain ol' masking tape (*not* blue painter's tape)

- □ FRESH Masking Fluid. (If it's old, it will look curdled or thick, smell really bad, and will be impossible to remove from your painting.) *Never* shake a bottle of masking fluid.
- □ Small container of table salt
- □ Blow Dryer
- □ Reference Photos: Bring a good quality color photo of what you would like to paint, preferably printed out to about 8.5x11 ish

Try to find 5 ml tubes online for between \$6-\$10 each.

TOTALLY STARTING FROM NOTHING?

<u>Paint</u>: **Six tubes** of paint is a good place to start. I recommend Daniel Smith's line (except for Ultramarine Light (Holbein). I sell some Daniel Smith options in 15ml tubes, as does NV Fine Arts in Reno, but you can purchase smaller 5ml tubes from online art retailers like DickBlick.com or Cheapjoes.com (Between \$6-\$10).

Good professional grade brands include: Daniel Smith, Holbein, Winsor n Newton, Richeson, M.Graham (note: Richeson and M.Graham pigments are bound with honey and do not harden – which can be an issue when transporting a palette). Please **do not** purchase starter kit paints, student grade or Academy paint brands, as you will just be frustrated.

This is a list of paints to consider. Each bullet point is "either or" **not both**. My preference is indicated with an *.

- Ultramarine Blue (Holbein)* or Cobalt Blue (Daniel Smith)
- Manganese Blue Hue (Daniel Smith)* or Cerulean Blue (Any Professional Brand)
- Quinacridone Rose (Daniel Smith)* or Permanent Alizarin Crimson
- Quinacridone Coral (Daniel Smith)* or Pyrrol Red
- Hansa Yellow Light or Medium* (Daniel Smith)* or Aureolin Yellow
- Raw Sienna Light (Daniel Smith)* or Quinacridone Gold
- Optional Transparent Pyrrol Orange (Daniel Smith)* or Burnt Sienna

<u>Brushes</u>: Loew-Cornell Brush #14 if you one buy only one brush (with the red stripe) <u>https://www.dickblick.com/products/loew-cornell-ultra-round-watercolordecorative-brushes/</u>

<u>Paper</u>: You can buy single sheets of watercolor paper at NV Fine Arts (22"x30") and we can size them down; expect to pay around \$7 to \$11/sheet.

• <u>Watercolor Paper</u>: Look for 140 lb. cold press*, soft press, or rough, Fabriano Artistico or Arches.

*Indicates my preference.

<u>Palette</u>: To start, I recommend a small, inexpensive palette with thumb-hole and 5 separated mixing areas. It can be purchased through Dick Blick online for just over \$3. https://www.dickblick.com/products/reeves-large-rectangular-watercolor-palette/

Michaels carries nice sketchbooks. As does Wall Mart. I like the XL brand. If you want to paint in the sketchbook, I recommend buying a book with at least 90lb paper (normally 60lb). <u>http://www.michaels.com/canson-xl-mix-media-</u>
